Investigations of skeletal remains from key archaeological sites reveal new data and offer insights on prehistoric life and health in the Southeast The shift from foraging to farming had important health consequences for prehistoric peoples but variations in health existed within communities that had made this transition This new collection draws on the rich bioarchaeological record of the Southeastern United States to explore variability in health and behavior within the age of agriculture It offers new perspectives on human adaptation to various geographic and cultural landscapes across the entire Southeast from Texas to Virginia and presents new data from both classic and little known sites The contributors question the reliance on simple cause and effect relationships in human health and behavior by addressing such key bioarchaeological issues as disease history and epidemiology dietary composition and sufficiency workload stress patterns of violence mortuary practices and biological consequences of European contact They also advance our understanding of agriculture by showing that uses of maize were more varied than has been previously supposed Representing some of the best work being done today by physical anthropologists this volume provides new insights into human adaptation for both archaeologists and osteologists It attests to the heterogeneous character of Southeastern societies during the late prehistoric and early historic periods while effectively detailing the many factors that have shaped biocultural evolution *Tatham Mound* Piers

**American Literature** Thomas Hallock, 2021-02-23 A Road Course in Early American Literature Travel and Teaching from Atzl n to Amherst explores a two part question what does travel teach us about literature and how can reading guide us to a deeper understanding of place and identity Thomas Hallock charts a teacher s journey to answering these questions framing personal experiences around the continued need for a survey course covering early American literature up to the mid nineteenth century Hallock approaches literary study from the overlapping perspectives of pedagogue scholar unrepentant tourist husband father friend and son Building on Ralph Waldo Emerson s premise that there is creative reading as well as creative writing Hallock turns to the vibrant and accessible tradition of American travel writing employing the form of biblio memoir to bridge the impasse between public and academic discourse and reintroduce the dynamic field of early American literature to wider audiences Hallock s own road course begins and ends at the Lowcountry of Georgia and South Carolina following a circular structure of reflection He weaves his journey through a wide swath of American literatures and authors from Native American and African American oral traditions to Wheatley and Equiano through Emerson Poe and Dickinson among others A series of longer place oriented narratives explore familiar and lesser known literary works from the sixteenth

century invasion of Florida through the Mexican War of 1846-1848 and the American Civil War. Shorter chapters bridge the book's central themes: the mapping of cognitive and physical space, our personal stake in reading, the tensions that follow earlier acts of erasure, and the impossibility of ever fully shutting out the past. Exploring complex cultural histories and contemporary landscapes filled with ghosts and new voices, this volume draws inspiration from a tradition of travel, place-oriented, and literature-based works ranging from William Carlos Williams's *In the American Grain* and Jack Kerouac's *On the Road* to Alice Walker's *In Search of Our Mother's Gardens*, Wendy Lesser's *Why I Read: The Serious Pleasure of Books*, and Rebecca Mead's *My Life in Middlemarch*. The De Soto expedition was the first major encounter of Europeans with indigenous North Americans in the eastern half of the United States. De Soto and his army of over 600 men, including 200 cavalry, spent four years traveling through what is now Florida, Georgia, Alabama, North and South Carolina, Tennessee, Mississippi, Louisiana, Arkansas, and Texas. *The De Soto Chronicles Volume 1* and *Volume 2* present for the first time all four primary accounts of the De Soto expedition together in English translation. The four primary accounts are generally referred to as Elvas Rangel Biedma in *Volume 1* and Garcilaso or the Inca in *Volume 2*. They further add brief essays about De Soto and the expedition, translations of De Soto documents from the Spanish *Archivo General de Indias*, two short biographies of De Soto, and bibliographical studies. They form the only detailed eyewitness records of the most advanced native civilization in North America: the Mississippian culture, a culture largely lost in the wake of European contact.

**Bioarchaeology of the Florida Gulf Coast** Dale L. Hutchinson, 2019-12-09

In *Bioarchaeology of the Florida Gulf Coast*, Dale Hutchinson explores the role of human adaptation along the Gulf Coast of Florida and the influence of coastal foraging on several indigenous Florida populations. The Sarasota landmark known as Historic Spanish Point has captured the attention of historians and archaeologists for over 150 years. This picturesque location includes remnants of a prehistoric Indian village and a massive ancient burial mound known to archaeologists as the Palmer Site, that is one of the largest mortuary sites uncovered in the southeastern United States. Interpreting the Palmer population, numbering over 400 burials circa 800 A.D., by analyzing such topics as health and diet, trauma, and demography, Hutchinson provides a unique view of a post-Archaic group of Indians who lived by hunting, collecting, and fishing rather than by agriculture. This book provides new data that support a general absence of agriculture among Florida Gulf Coast populations within the context of great similarities but also substantial differences in nutrition and

health Along the central and southern Florida Gulf Coast multiple lines of evidence such as site architecture settlement density and size changes in ceramic technology and the diversity of shell and stone tools suggest that this period was one of emerging social and political complexity accompanied by population growth The comparisons between the Florida Gulf Coast and other coastal regions illuminate our understanding of coastal adaptation while comparisons with interior populations further stimulate thoughts regarding the process of culture change during the agricultural era A volume in the Florida Museum of Natural History Ripley P Bullen Series *Early Spanish Florida* Judith A.
